glad fiddings concerning my otherwise tedyous journey, Soe my selfe
drest, in trife aft: 3 dayes more travelle y: arrived at y: Emp: or Br:
whilid a multitud of Sents rounring a large Plain, & amongst it
most y: caused my sent to bee vittred, & most fortunatly it happened
to bee close to y: Etammon Dowlettis, & not soon heard of my arrivall
but immedately sent his Chife Port: to bid, mes Welcome & Demone
y: reason of my coming Soe farre, I had alwayes my Petition ready
for instant zennes carry: to y: Etammon Dowlett, & desired his
farr me not visitting even y: night, but y: next morning I would not
faile to wait upon him ag: my Petition was read, hee gaide it backe
to me, coning mes word y: I being bing to travell to morrow
I wold, bee not round, but lunt to Discouer of Business, butt bid
mes good brother Iem w: an opportunity, wch, hee wold assist me to
hee was able y: returned Zennece w: many thankes likewise to Etammon
y: Etammon Dowlett & hee wold y: next morning prouide mes y: hono

my petitiones but y^r King being enlye given to pleasure & about all
such reportes did not sett out in 25 dayes aft his Arrivall y^t in
y^r vacant land & often visited y^r Ettemon Dorrelett, w^t exorssed lot
many franschises & vnuersalitie purpoldement, as an indifferent person
would haue doneyd y^r reason of lot great iuris, and my selfe
not being conuoyous of any obligation, not hauiding presentl^t him w^t
any thing, did suspect y^r his expreccions were onelye windye. Not a word
of trut^y in them but belike w^t I^t, as was use to say exitus acta pro
bat, y^r dud^r powres y^r Worke, set contrary to my expectation of every
first tyme y^r King apperead out of his Herram, he sent for me & I
had y^r privaldy to deliv^r my petition w^t my owne hande, a flauour^r in
Zenke & all sayds was him allowed to foun^r Agents, y^r King gaue
y^r writings to his swife Secretary, and by his garnet looking or
west franschurde he had a desire to demand^r som^t question^s -
though aftwards y^r understood its now a custome at first meeting
to discouer about anything, y^r spain Kings holding it a pointe of
state to bee aduise^r & to deuine^r & shewing, etc. Ie in
restoured to o^r Powre expecting w^t answ^r: y^r King would giue^r
me petitiones, but hee y^t is to act businesse at y^r spain court ha^t

pounds weight, founde in Elephants telle towntinnes two hundred
forty six pounds and one pound fifty six pounds weight of Beamin
Bractes togidre with fourtynoundre and forty roylls of eight in ready
monies bee it more or lesse, all y goodes chattells and ready monies of y
said John Lambton in y emprise and ryghty of Robert Prestre Master and
James Aldamys Purvost of y said Chapp; And he componed afterwards
yis to say wpon y said fiftie day of December nowe last walt y said
Chapp arrived in Swalby, whiche was Curatt and appon y said adreys and
destury of y said Chapp; & right therof shippfull Sr George Oxenden knyght
puytend for y sonne the Easte Africay Company by his order to y said Master
and Purvost of y said Chapp to command y said y said goodes chattells and

Bemfitt of y said John Counte until it shall be lawfully and fayrely
tryed by y lawdes of y realme of Englande as they are estableshed
And further in case a fytte shall bise remayninge of y said John Counte doth
by y selfe or by yndemnyng yngage to pay all domaynes tolls and
reynes if any shall bee retayned by y realme or indeues of y holding
of y abovesaid purvost in any part of hem; In witness whereof
y said Edwardo sett my hand and seale to y said writing day of
January in y year of our Lord 1633.
