I cannot but thinke it long since I last wrote

doubt neglect in me. I kept mee silent, without want of new notice of any
shippes arrivall to Bruns. yett if vsuall time being neere, I thought I
not lesse yo^u. my Duty to Dispoode these few Lines, to be ready for yo^u. first
conveniently, & so yo^u. may bee inform^d. w^hat happend at Court &
my stay here, w^hich relation I shall send to yo^u. favourable & direct all as followeth.

Yo^u. Hoyp. knowe how much I was inuolued against
y^e. Shambard. for his cruelty to o^r. Brethren Lockers, & in my apprehension
it was not w^hich out reason, for should I not resent yo^u. abuse, done to those
yo^u. are vnder me, it would, but order yo^u. way for yo^u. selfe Affronte, to be
more importunately, on my selfe, wherefore I thought it highly conuenient
not to make my address to yo^u. King, soe having yo^u. all things ready
fitting for such a Journey, I set forward y^e. 10th. Octob^r. and four dayes aft^r.
I was on yo^u. way (y^e. Mustoachee, w^hich was bringing word to Spahaunc
y^e. Kings resolution to make his Winter Quarters there) w^hich was to mee was
glad tidings & reviving my other w^hich to yo^u. Journey, soe much
w^hich in briefe aft^r. 3 dayes more travell I arrivd at y^e. Camp, w^here
I beheld a multitude of Sents rounding a large Plain, & amongst yo^u.
rest I perceivd my Sents to be pitched, & most fortunately it happend
to be close to y^e. Attamon Dowletts, w^hich not soon heard of my arrivall,
but immediately sent his Right Hon^{or}. to bid mee Welcome & Deman
yo^u. reason of my coming soe farre, I had allwayes my Petition read
y^e. instant Genes carry to yo^u. Attamon Dowlett, & desired
for my not visiting him, yo^u. might, but yo^u. next morning I would not
faile to waitt upon him aft^r. my Petition was read, hee gaue it backe
yo^u. request, sending mee word yo^u. King being to travell to morrow
I would, bee not convenient him to Discourse of Business, but hee
was bee Ketter, I am w^hich an opportunity w^hich, hee would assist mee
he was able I returned Genes w^hich many thanks, & desired to see
yo^u. Attamon Dowlett, hee would yo^u. next morning procure mee yo^u. hand
to King y^e. Kings flotte, & his Mai^{ty}. might take notice how farre wee were
some hee sent mee word to gett upp before break of Day & hee doubted
not to satisfie mee in yo^u. request, & accordingly yo^u. next morning stand
ing ready, yo^u. Attamon Dowlett appointt two Dulges to carry mee before

State to be assured y. he was a King, & so I was
I returned to choice, expecting w. anew y. King would give
my petitions, but hee y. is to set business at y. Persians Court had

would be a means to keep y^e in awe from acting or reporting aught
unjudicial to o^r hon^{ble} employ^{ed}; I shall not be furth^{er} troublesome to y^e
present, only dut^y at y^e acceptance of most unfeign^d & private salutes

To all whome these present writings shall come, I shew yea, that I, John
Cout, Merchant, havinge a certain debt due and owinge unto mee from our
John Lambton Merchant at Curatt deceased, and havinge first & certayne
intelligence that y^e said John Lambton had founde all goodes & chattell
monies in y^e good Ship of Curatt which he & y^e said John Cout had upon
y^e fift day of December now last past made liquidation and stoppall
of sixe Baskets of Curle Shells containinge one thousand eighty four
pounds weight, founde ten Cheapes of the countinge two hundred
forty six pounds and one thousand fifty six pounds weight of Beamin
Beads together with four hundred and forty royalls of eight in ready
monies be it more or lesse as y^e goods & chattells and ready monies of y^e
said John Lambton in y^e care and custody of the best Judges Master and
James Adams Purvor of y^e same Ship; And hee upon after wards
it is to say upon y^e said fift day of December now last past y^e said
Ship arrived in Swallye where was Curatt and upon y^e said daye and
delivry of y^e said Ship; y^e right Worshipfull Sr George Oxinden knight
Presidnt for y^e Honorable East India Company by his order to y^e said Master
and Purvor of y^e said Ship to murther y^e said goods & chattells and
ready monies to be delivred into his hands and possession, and
now for as much as y^e aboutsaid goods & chattells are ready monies
and remaininge in y^e hands and custody of y^e said Sr George Oxinden knight
I doe therefore by these presents make requesition and stoppall of y^e
aboutsaid goods & chattells & ready monies in y^e hands of y^e said Sr George
Oxinden, And for y^e doinge of whiche y^e said John Cout doo by these presents
covenant & agree to w^{ch} y^e said Sr George Oxinden to have firmly
and duly performe and performe what shal be shewd any right
title interest or charge to any of y^e aboutsaid goods & chattells or ready
monies for as aforesaid liquidation & stoppall & delivry in y^e hands and
custody of y^e said Sr George Oxinden for y^e purpose aforesaid and
benefit of y^e said John Cout until it shall be legally and fairly
tryed by y^e lawes of y^e Realme of Englande as they are established
And further in case a suite shall be moved or made or established
by any person or persons, or any other party of y^e said John Cout
regardes if any shall be moved by reason or means of y^e delivry
of y^e aboutsaid goods or any part of them; In w^{ch} case y^e weare of
y^e said John Cout shall paye and shall be bound to paye the same
January in y^e year of our Lord 1667.

As in all of your former Letters was not a little Startled perceiving you so suddenly
threw me for neglect in not forwarding your Hon. Comps. packett, & that
I should had my self layd at Stake, in my apprehension I could not have
contrived a more probable & direct way to have it Directly bro't to yo. Worshipp
owne hands for being at Emunity wth y^e Shawbund. and having depending
of yo. Duties & things third Order's business to intercept the same, made
me desire them to Mulluchund (bro't) to Ballarund & Suddarun at Surin
had wth amongst his things, and had yo. had yo. charge of them was not strange
but yo. said Mulluchund's great Sittors Son, whose servant in not distant
time got soon as yo. might expect was an accident out of my power to
prevent, and truly at first I hoped yo. not long knowledge of me, would have
dispens'd all holdings, & I would offer to be tardy in a business of such
importance, and though I in your things, confesse yo. had nothing to do wth
yo. yo. were pleas'd to remind us of it again, & consequently receive
sorrow, for from yo. oration we are only able to show words for yo.
maintaining our Most. hon. & priviledges, & yo. injunction to keep yo.
going for me away, private, made me writt a spirital. answer to yo.
in yo. Gen. but it sounds M. Flow. haty sufficiently I divulg'd
albeit yo. had it to surrode Agent, and I had had intenc'd to make a
at Combroont on yo. same board, God send him or wth du. the more
my success. must happiness, for my part I envy not, and was surpris'd
in yo. Comps. employem. my three foot grief is yo. I could not see fairly
off as I out expect'd, but und. yo. notion of a serv. negligent in his Mas
Affaires, howe. I. yo. need not doubt of my ready compliance, so far as
I am able to all yo. Comands, and God sparing me life I do intend to
goe Down to Combro. so soon as possible, where if I meet a Shipp and
yo. Ord. continue, I will undoubtedly imbarquet my self, and among
all thoughts shall surge out yo. Contentment, of having an Opportunity
to see yo. Worshipp hands, & I shall omit a spirital. relation of o. dining
Shawbund. by all having already mention'd in yo. Gen. one gaining a
great victory over him, but I do not great are yo. accusations Drawn up
against him; & if yo. King respects not his being a Syhud, one of Mahomed
sonnes, he will certainly loose his life; Besides me I thinke not small
Ord. was have gain'd by yo. Business, and for certaintie yo. Dig. will
all

able to sta two or three yards more at Ound: th out of least disturbance,
likewise y^e. non shamburd swore to mee by all his protestations & othors
that hee would content mee more y^e. any of his proceedings, and when we
shooke hands to continue mutuall friends, I told him if hee pleased
I would show him all I performed, and in case hee had any thing
to say against y^e. I would accompany him to Ettamou Dorellets, y^e.
there might be a right understanding before hee parted, for an words of
woed, not be troubled about any thing for y^e. King himselfe had given a speciall
charge to use us fairly, soe y^e. y^e. may provide y^e. last yards storm
is wrotty well blown out, yett I shall not be soe much y^e. shamburd I said
words as his performance, & wth. from thence I have gathered y^e. true
meaning of his heart y^e. shall be informed wth. we may trust to, but
it would be fruitlesse hopes to imagine we shall see: 2000. y^e. full Majesty
of y^e. Customs of Hamburgh, unless we be in a capacity to force as well
as Demand it, we must therefore awaite y^e. good hours wth. patience
and wth. due y^e. Eng^l. doe begin there must be a resolution to execute it to

not according to expectation will be a means to hindring y^e. loss of all, yett

Barrowe, but wth. I gett downe to Ound: I am resolved, hee shall not escape soe
for I am informed hee hath gott some balg in his possession & oth^r. speciall: of
consequen^t, soe y^e. unless hee send: mee a best: Acc^t. y^e. l^{tr}. to I have doe:
I shall give O^r. to charge on him, and intend to use him like a madde man,
binding him to his good behaviour / I gave l^{tr}. to Doregault Jocher, y^e.
kinsman to make safe of M. Lambtons Sappoon Wood, but as yett I have not
notise of it, Dispoes all I hope a small summe more will conclude all, in this
intaine take leave & remain

 -ortant are therein contained, as doe forbid, and indeed is very unbecom^{ing}
